Black History Month

The celebration of Black History Month began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a Black historian, scholar, educator and publisher. It became a month-long celebration in 1976. Woodson was dedicated to celebrating the contributions of Black people in the United States. His parents were freed slaves in Virginia, and Woodson feared that Black children who had slaves for parents, but were born free, or had been freed, wouldn't have had an equal opportunity to learn like normal children, despite being free. Woodson had thought about how America should acknowledge the struggle and adversity that Black Americans had to face from the 1800s to the 1900s. What was originally a week of celebration for just Black Americans, later turned into a month-long celebration. This happened because many intelligent Black students at Kent University shared the same ideology that Woodson had. The first celebration for Black History Month took place in 1970, from January 2 to February 28. Unfortunately, it took six more years of celebrations for Black History Month to finally be acknowledged by America. Black History Month is just not celebrated enough. People don't see Black History Month as something super significant, which is highly upsetting to me, especially since I come from an inter-racial background; my dad is black and my mom is white. I believe it's unfair for people like me to not be shown more appreciation.

Baldur's Gate 3 is a turn-based role playing game made by Larian Studios and released on Aug. 3, 2023. That same year, Baldur's Gate 3 won game of the year with six other nominations. It also won best multiplayer game of the year; best role playing game; best playervoice award; best performance; and best community award. The release of Baldur's Gate 3 signifies an advancement in the traditional fantasy genre of Computer Role Playing Games (CRPGs) that were pioneered by BioWare years ago. California Flooding

California recently experienced catastrophic storms in the Los Angeles area. The historic storms of biblical proportions caused strong winds, heavy rainfall and flash floods across the state. Nearly half a million residents were left without power.

The storm, which occurred from Feb. 4-6, was caused by the atmospheric river, which are relatively long, narrow regions in the atmosphere – like rivers in the sky – that transport most of the water vapor outside of the tropics. According to usatoday. com, "A moving corridor of air that can carry water for miles, brought heavy rain at low altitudes and snow at higher elevations."

The National Weather Service in California issued flash flood warnings due to the potential floods and threat of mudslides. Landslides are large-scale movement of rocks, debris, and dirt down a slope. California flooding, rains and heavy snow killed at least 17 people and caused more than \$30 billion in damages and economic losses, according to AccuWeather Inc.

Opinion: The World's "Politically Forgotten" Protest Globally

Over the past two decades many European, North American, and South American governments have been dominated by a reign of left-wing politics. Liberal governments from the United States to Europe to Latin America to Africa have been elected after years of popular conservative politics in the 1980s and 1990s. But recently the grip of left wing parties on global governments is slipping. Approval ratings for the Democratic President Joe Biden have hit an all-time low. According to Gallup, Italy, Netherlands and Argentina have elected wildly popular conservative leaders, and protestors have fought back against their left-wing capitals in Brazil and Uganda. The growing consensus in these countries seems



to be that they've had enough. In the last three months, France's farmers have encircled the city of Paris with tractors; Germany's unemployed have marched on the capital of Berlin; and Texas truck drivers have lined up across the US-Mexico border. All protesting left-wing policies. As conservatives gain popularity, historian Amity Shales writes, "People have good reason to be fed up with years of liberal policy." In a speech at the Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC) and in her book titled "The Forgotten Man," she explains how left-wing politicians neglect and ransack the general welfare they claim to protect. This is evident as wars have broken out when progressive leaders drain military spending as described by a new Brookings study. Inflation skyrockets when liberals print exorbitant money according to the Euro Inflation Rate. In a CBS news report, illegal immigrants overwhelm nations when



liberals fail to protect citizens as witnessed when a New York school moved kids online to house illegal immigrants. Shales explains that progressive governments have become disconnected with the actual wants of their people. Shales discussed, "As they become more centralized and aggregate more power, political 'establishments' have forgotten the actual people who they serve and fall easily to cultural vanities." Therefore, citizens on the losing end have been dubbed the "politically forgotten." In attempts to become seen, protests have escalated. Most recently, demonstrations in Europe have shaken up liberal governments. Farmers in France encircled the city in tractors and

blocked highways and streets. Unemployed and poor Germans marched by the tens of thousands against new liberal policies that have greatly hurt them. But the changes go beyond Europe. When President Joe Biden failed to defend the United States border, some Texans lined up trucks and semi-vehicles along the U.S.-Mexico border, and the state National Guard was directed to put up defenses. And after the previously imprisoned politician left-wing Lula De Silva assumed the presidency in Brazil and liberal Nigerian dictator Yoweri Museveni continued his office, protests filled the streets of their capital cities. More than ever, the forgotten people of politics have become aggravated with governments who refuse to view their ideas as mainstream and become increasingly polarized. Once nobel political parties claimed to put people first, more than ever they have put them last.

This year has brought in a new system, replacing the old grading system with 40, 55, 70, 85, and 100. This system has been a topic of debate the entire school year and will change again in the next school year, going to a 0 to 5 grading system. However, with the 2023-2024 grading system, students and teachers alike have different points of view about how it works. Students are the main demographic of people being affected by the current grading system, and many have negative opinions about it. 
Is AI Technology Beneficial or Detrimental?

Trump's Racketeering Case Continues

In a twist in the ongoing Donald Trump racketeering case, the Georgia prosecutor spearheading the legal proceedings was subpoenaed for a disqualification hearing in the election- interference case against Trump and his allies.

The defense is arguing that Fani Willis, the Fulton County district attorney, and her office should be disqualified and removed from the prosecution, accusing her of benefiting financially from a relationship with lead Prosecutor Nathan Wade, who she hired to manage the case. The defense lawyers discovered that Willis and Wade were having a romantic relationship, which the lawyers said compromised the election-fraud case. They accused Willis of benefitting financially from the six-figure salary that Wade was paid for handling the case, referring to cruises and out-of-state trips that the two took together.

Trump was accused of leading a "criminal racketeering" network so that the 2020 election votes would be in his favor. Willis opened an investigation in February 2021, and in August 2023, a grand jury indicted Trump and coconspirators who were involved in trying to overturn President Joe Biden's win in Georgia. On Feb. 15, Willis and Wade testified in the disqualification hearing and Willis accused the defense lawyers of lying. In a highly combative testimony, she told the court that she wasn't on trial but that Trump and his co-defendants are the ones on trial.

Willis and Wade had a different timeline of when their relationship started, which is significant to case. The defense said it started before Wade was hired in November 2021, but the couple said it was in early 2022. Willis also testified that she paid Wade back for money he spent on lavish trips they went on while dating. Wade also testified that the relationship ended last summer.

Two AAE students described their feelings about the case.

Teigen Green said, "I feel that Trump should have been indicted for the riots that happened a couple of years ago. I also feel that he is still a better president than Biden though."

And student Devon Nance said, "I found the [case] very surprising because I feel he got off too easy for his accused crimes." The outcome of this hearing holds significant implications for the trajectory of the Trump racketeering case, adding another layer of complexity to the closely watched legal battle surrounding the former president.

My grandmother has always been such a creative woman, and I have always admired her for that. She went to school in Puerto Rico, specifically to study confectionary, which is the making of sweets and desserts. When she finished school, she continued experimenting with desserts and this led her to invent her own way of making her favorite dessert, "Flancocho." Flan and Bizcocho (cake).

Ingredients for Flan
1 can of evaporated milk
1 can of sweetened condensed milk
1 tsp vanilla extract
4 eggs
A pinch of salt Ingredients for vanilla cake
A box of vanilla cake mix
Make sure you have the ingredients listed on the box

Instructions

Make the caramel by pouring sugar into a pan and melting it over medium heat 16 Once melted, pour the caramel into a pan of your choice; making sure the whole bottom is covered Set the pan aside and wait for the caramel to cool While the caramel is cooling, make the vanilla cake from the box Bake at 350 degrees for an hour, or until there is no residue when a toothpick is inserted In a blender combine all the ingredients for the flan, and blend till smooth When the vanilla cake is baked and cool, transfer it into the pan with the caramel coat Poke holes in the cake with a utensil of your choice, we often use a wooden skewer Pour the flan batter on top of the vanilla cake, making sure it is soaked in Pour water into a flat pan and place the cake on top Lastly, bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes And there you have it, a Flancocho.



Celebrating Presidents Day

Presidents Day is commemorated annually on the third Monday in February. But technically, under the Uniform Monday Holiday Act of 1971, it is the date designated for the



federal Washington's Birthday holiday, which was first established in 1885 to honor the birthday of George Washington, the first president of the United States, who was born on February 22, 1732. According to history.com, Washington's Birthday was an unofficial observance until 1879, when President Rutherford B. Hayes signed it into law. Gradually, the celebration included Abraham Lincoln, who was born on Feb. 12, 1809, and became America's 16th president in 1860. There were efforts right after Lincoln's death to get his birthday recognized as a holiday, but there has never been a federal Lincoln-birthday holiday. The shift from Washington's Birthday to Presidents Day began in the late 1960s, when Congress proposed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which changed the celebration of several federal holidays from specific dates to select Mondays. The change created more three-day weekends for employees, and private businesses saw it as a way to increase retail sales. While several states still have individual holidays honoring the birthdays of Washington, Lincoln and other figures, Presidents Day is now popularly viewed as a day to celebrate the birthdays and lives of all United States' presidents. This year, Presidents Day fell on Feb. 19, and most Connecticut public schools were closed, and many Connecticut state employees had a paid day off. AAE students and teachers had Feb. 19 and 20 off from school. As a federal holiday, many banks; the New York Stock Exchange, NASDAQ and post offices were also closed.
